Pastor Bill's "May-day Meanderings"

"At once the man was made well, and he took up his mat and began to walk" (John 5:9 nrsv)



We sometimes tend to forget that Jesus' touch lifts us up and out of the ordinary into the extraordinary. This man had been ill and crippled for years -- 38 years to be exact -- and Jesus told him to get up, pick up your mat, and walk. And he got up and walked. He took a chance on Jesus; it is called "faith!" It seems to me there are times when we hear Jesus but respond, "well, Lord, let me check this out before I take any chance or attempt anything new." But, isn't our faith about taking chances and attempting new things for God? I believe so.

I believe there are times when we have to pick up whatever "mat" we have and begin walking as Jesus directs; then we will find new life in Christ. The question is: what "mat" is keeping you from walking as Christ commands? We all have them!

As we head into May and race rapidly toward the warmth (heat?) of summer, I believe there are many things we can do in the name of Jesus, starting right at home and in our neighborhood and in church and in our church's neighborhood.

I am constantly asking myself, "what should I be taking a chance on doing or attempting in Jesus' name?" And the older I get the more answers I get. What about you?

As we move into the spring and summer we see lots ahead of us: Vacation Bible School; opportunities to bring friends to church; time to study the Bible with either the men on Wednesday or the Women on Tuesdays or with lots of people on Sundays before worship begins. Maybe time to gather two or three friends together to pray for yourselves, for the joys and concerns you've heard on Sunday mornings, for the church, for our nation, and for this world in which God has placed us.

As I wrote here last month, there is so much to do and so little time and money with which to do it. But, I am confident God will supply all our needs! God always does! But God says very clearly: You are needed to get the job done!

What is happening in worship in May? May 2nd, Communion, we will be blessed to have the Rev. Pat Stout with us again leading worship, preaching and administrating the Lord's Supper. That Sunday both Joyce and I will be participating in our daughter, the Rev. Julie Hodge's, installation as one of the Associate Pastors at the Palm Desert Community Presbyterian Church and both Joyce and I have been elected by the Presbytery to be part of the Installing Commission of Presbytery. We will miss you on the 2nd but will rejoice with her. On May 30th we will have Elder Suzanne Swartz leading worship and preaching, as Joyce and I will be returning late that day from a week's vacation. Other than that, as you will note in the article about worship and preaching, I will be here the other Sundays.

As I also wrote last month, I want to assure all of us that I am convinced that this church has a great future; that is, I firmly believe God has a great future for us: a resurrection of sorts. How you and I respond will determine the results of God's future for PSPC.

EASTER ISN'T OVER

During your preparations for Easter, you may have heard someone say, "All this work and it'll all be over soon." Sorry, but they're wrong.

Easter as a celebration of the return of spring, the Easter of the Easter Bunny and colored eggs and candy, fancy hats and new spring clothes may be over by Easter Monday, not to come around again until next year.

But the true Easter, the celebration of Christ's resurrection, is never over. Easter is the reminder and the celebration of a continuing fact: Christ, who was raised from death, is alive today, tomorrow and forever. Daily he offers us and the whole world power to begin new life now.

Easter isn't over ... ever!



UP BUT NOT AWAY

Many Christian denominations celebrate the Feast of the Ascension, which refers to a post-resurrection event that took place 40 days after Easter. This year it occurs on May 13.

According to Luke, Jesus led his friends to a Jerusalem suburb called Bethany. While on a small mountain, he blessed his friends and then rose into heaven while they watched.

The ascension was such a momentous occasion that after Jesus disappeared, his followers had a worship service at the spot. Then they "returned to Jerusalem with great joy" (Luke 24:52, NRSV).

Because Christ had promised to be with his followers always (Matthew 28:20), from then on they knew he would be with them as Spirit. Jesus' body was up and away, but spiritually he was still and always would be their companion.



A FRESH LOOK AT PENTECOST

Fifty days after Jesus' resurrection, on a day called Pentecost, the Christian church was born. Because Pentecost was a holiday celebrating the harvest (a bit like our Thanksgiving), the apostles and a large crowd had gathered to celebrate in Jerusalem.

Many people had assembled near Peter and the other followers of Christ when "From heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind ... (Acts 2:2 NRSV). Then tongues of fire descended on everyone in the crowd.

After the wind and fire descended, all sorts of languages, known and unknown, came out of the crowd. Each person spoke "about God's deeds of power" (verse 11). No wonder Luke wrote, "All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" (Verse 12).

The whole affair was mind-boggling and life changing. The Holy Spirit had come upon many people; they knew God was powerfully at work in their midst.

On Pentecost many years ago, some 3,000 people came to believe in Christ. That's why today Christians remember this powerful event as the birthday of the church. Pentecost occurs on May 23 this year.

MORE THAN A NAME

When the late CBS correspondent Ed Bradley visited the Vietnam Memorial in Washington, D.C., he found a letter propped against the black wall. It read:

"I wanted to come back and say hello. You know, I went ahead and married Dick, and we have a beautiful little girl. Her favorite color is purple, the color of this stationery. I went to Arlington to see your grave, and on it, it said you got a Purple Heart for dying. Well, this is your purple heart for having lived. I hope that our daughter finds as wonderful and as beautiful a first love as you were for me. Good-bye. Hello. Nancy."

That's a strong reminder that those we honor on Memorial Day are more than simply names. They were living people who loved and were loved ... and are still loved.

SESSION NOTES HIGHLIGHTS

The Session met for it's regular meeting on Wednesday, April 21 church's social hall at 9:30a.m. Present were all Elders plus Elder Anne Smith from Presbytery. Elder Harry Henderson was excused. Pastor Bill read in a devotional from the 2010 Yearbook of Prayer and Study about the outreach of a church similar to ours, and then the Session opened with prayer. Elder Anne Smith shared information with the Session about the Pastor Nominating Committee process and progress.

Session discussed and acted to approve several requests: 1) to approve a Vacation Bible School June 21-25 with the names of volunteers; 2) to approve the names of four members of PSPC who are assisting in reading for 3rd graders at the Cahuilla school; 3) to approve a Centering Prayer group during the week led by Elder Allen Perrier; 4) approved a seminar and possible support group on Alzheimer's, and other dementias, led by Don Shepherd; 5) discussed and decided where to place the beautiful Lord's Table in the Sanctuary.

The moderator referred to the Worship and Music Committee the questions of the number and times of services during the "Season" when our Winter Residents and many visitors are here.

Session also heard from Elder Fran Gotenstein, and briefly discussed, the results of the questionnaire passed out to the congregation a month or so ago: 44 responded with many helpful responses.

Session heard reports on the church's finances and on pulpit supplies whenever Pastor Bill and Joyce are away, including having Elder Suzanne Swartz preach and lead worship on Sunday, May 30.

Session acted, according to the Book of Order; to place ten members on the Inactive Membership roles and those they will be notified in writing and/or by phone calls.

Session adjourned about 11:55 a.m. with Pastor Bill complementing them on a job well done and closing with prayer.

From Susan McGuire's Kitchen Taco Soup

1 small onion, diced

1 lb. ground beef or turkey

1 med. can corn (about 15 oz.)

1 med. can kidney beans

1 med. can stewed tomatoes

1 pkg. mild taco seasoning

1 med. can black olives

Tortilla chips

Shredded cheese

Fresh cilantro

Sour Cream

Sauté the meat until browned, with onions. Then add the corn, beans & tomatoes with their liquid, seasoning mix, and drained olives. Mix and heat completely. Offer cheese, chips, fresh cilantro and sour cram to top off the soup.
