

" (The kingdom of God) is like a mustard seed, which is the smallest seed you plant in the ground. Yet when it is planted, it grows and becomes the largest of all garden plants, with such big branches that the birds of the air can perch in its shade." (Mk 4:31)



As I write this, I am preparing to make a trip north to take care of business surrounding my house. It is likely I will prepare it for sale, and while this is a difficult thing, it is a good thing. My neighbors keep me apprised of its state, but an empty house is a lonely house. So, my mantra for the journey has become, 'paint, prune and plant.' But if I list it for sale, the mantra can be, 'paint, prune, plant and post.' And, if I invite some friends over to celebrate the years spent there, it might be, 'paint, prune, plant, post and party!' Seeing those words stacked together reminds me not only how hard it can be to declare a purpose, but if the naming all begins with the same sound, it can be downright impossible! Not unlike life, in general.

It never ceases to amaze how the bible speaks afresh every time it is opened, no matter the number of times. The parable of the mustard seed resembles the well-worn edges of a beloved book, and still touches the center of our purpose, as God's own. We are, ourselves, much like a house, aren't we? Our bodies are bearers of the soul; yet we, too, can fall into disrepair and loneliness. Even if our lives appear to be fulfilling, we may have a feeling of emptiness, a sense that something is amiss or missing. A thought comes to mind that it could be healing if, at intervals throughout our lives, we painted, pruned, planted, posted and partied. If we remembered the seed of our faith, the root of our souls and tended to the garden that we are, God's garden.

So often life chips away at the very thing that can bring us the most joy, the simple nature of faith. While we may know and celebrate God's love for us, the living nature of that grace can be obscured, as we forget our child-like hearts. By renewing our faith through purposeful attention, by working on letting go of what is oppressing in our lives, by opening ourselves to new ideas that will nurture the mustard seed of our faith, by sharing our journey with others and, finally, by celebrating with a joy that is at once past, present and future, we can experience the intention and fulfillment that is God's desire for us.

As God's Word is a living word, so our faith is a living, faith. The seed of that truth will not go away; it is just waiting to be watered. Each of us will go about a purposeful renewal in our singular way. The important idea is, to 'go about it!' Let the roots of your faith find freedom; find new paths, around the stones and clouds, around complacency, doubt, or challenge. And don't be surprised when you feel shoots of new life lifting you upward and forward, and shading you along the way.

Two months ago I began what is intended to be bi-monthly "news" on the financial health of PSPC. Monthly financial summaries are available in Sunday bulletins, but space does not allow much comment to accompany the numbers. We are pleased with Church activities and with Reverend Christine's leadership of our small and growing membership. An indication of this was combined (two services) attendance on Easter Sunday of over 300 worshipers. The packed

services, by far the greatest attendance I believe we have had in years, were amazing!

Pledge payments and other Sunday contributions have given PSPC a good financial start to 2013. Through April I believe we were slightly behind budget in pledge receipts and plate offerings, but also slightly positive to budget in controlling expenses. We are about "on track". The principle point is that as we enter the warmer and slower summer months it is imperative that we continue to focus on the financial needs of our PSPC home. We must keep our pledge payments current. We hope and pray that our seasonal visitors will contribute to their "winter" church home while enjoying summer in cooler climes. And we need some positive, non-budget revenue surprises. PSPC is open 52 weeks a year, with costs to be paid for weekly.

To conclude with a particularly positive note: In late April we received just such a positive, non-budgeted gift in the form of a \$4,000 check from Riverside Presbytery. The funds came from a small reserve established (at least in part) to subsidize small-church budgets, where congregations are struggling to afford a full-time salary for a new pastor. What a wonderful gift! You will remember that earlier this year we increased Pastor Christine's salary to Presbytery minimum from three-quarters salary previously. This qualified PSPC for such Presbytery help. Now it is our responsibility to continue our increased giving, so that we earn anew the trust Presbytery has placed in us, and to keep looking for, or developing, those non-budgeted gifts.



From the Kitchen of Kay Chabot

Turkey Salad

1 package Uncle Ben's original long grain and wild rice (don't use "fast cooking" one)

Prepare to package directions with spice packet and all and then chill)

2 generous cups cubed cooked turkey breast (I use the Costco one)

1/2 pound sliced fresh mushrooms

1 chopped red pepper

2 cups firmly packed spinach leaves cut into strips (I use more)

6 green onions with tops, sliced

15-20 cherry or grape tomatoes, halved

Dressing:

1/3 cup dry white wine (chardonnay is fine)

1/4 cup olive oil

2 t sugar

1/2 t salt

1/4 t pepper

Add all ingredients except tomatoes to chilled rice, add dressing, mix well, and chill several hours or even overnight is fine. Stir before serving and then add cherry tomatoes or use them for garnish.


